Clubhouse Solar Project Update

The Tamarack Trails ad hoc solar committee continues to work at the direction of the Board of Directors on the proposal for a solar system to be installed on the roof of the clubhouse. The proposed solar panel array is a 17.1-kilowatt system that would provide more than 50 percent of the electricity used annually by the clubhouse and swimming pool. The proposal also includes an needed upgrade of the clubhouse's electrical equipment and additional framing over the building's southfacing balcony.

If the project is approved by the board of directors, the installation is slated to take place in the autumn after the pool closes for the season.

An easel has been set up in the clubhouse lobby with information and illustrations explaining the project. Another informational meeting is planned for the 1st half of April. If you have more questions about the plan, you're welcome to contact Dave Larson


PARKING of VEHICLES, MOTORCYCLES, and MOTOR SCOOTERS (Book of Standards, BOS)

18a. Vehicle Parking — Residents' cars should be parked in the garage or on the Owner's Living Unit driveway apron. Cleared driveways enhance the aesthetic appearance of the community. See also Tamarack Trails Policy Resolution I-102, <u>https://www.tamaracktrails.com/wp-content/uploads/2022/12/PolicyResolutions-2022.pdf</u>.

18b. Motorcycle and Motor Scooter Parking—Resident's motorcycle and motor scooter should be parked in the garage or on Owner's Living Unit driveway.

What does this mean for me, my neighbors and visitors? If you have a one-car garage, you are allowed to park up to two vehicles, which means one may be parked in your garage and one in your driveway. If you have a two-car garage, you are allowed to park up to four vehicles on your unit lot; two in the garage and two in the driveway. All other vehicles may need to be parked on city streets or at alternate locations. Guests may use, if available, Guest Parking.

IMPORTANCE OF PROJECT PLANNING



It is that time of year that some of us begin to think about doing some updating inside and outside of our units. Here are just a few steps to follow if your project is one that may need approval by the Architectural Review Board.

• First know when the ARB meets and when a request must be submitted to the Office; also familiarize

yourself with Policy IV-401, the Book of Standards (found on the webpage).

- If the proposed project is one that may enlarge the building exterior, be aware that there is a 60% density restriction for exterior expansions or alterations. There is an excel spread sheet available to assist in finding the current and proposed density for your unit.
- Determine if your project request requires the submittal of Form 1 or Form 2; see BOS.
- Form 1 Exterior Expansion or Alternations. Examples being rebuilding of decks/patios, enclosed spaces, and any 'attachments" to the unit exterior, etc. In all cases when working with your contractor, <u>share a copy of the BOS early in the planning</u> <u>or bid process</u>. Before submitting your request to the ARB, reach out to your neighbors and keep them apprised of your plans; their input is important.
- Form 2 Expedited Requesting Non-Construction or Replacement Proposals. The following are examples of Expedited Review requests -- window/door replacements, door colors, ramps, steps/handrails, solar arrays and tunnels, various exhaust venting, and non-hardwired security appurtenances.

The Association is responsible for the water mains and sewer mains and lateral lines up to the exterior foundation wall except for the private exterior backflow valves and shutoff valves. The Owner is responsible for all interior water and sewer piping, valves and fixtures. including the exterior sewer backflow valves and water shutoff valves serving the individual Living Unit.

With the Tamarack anniversary year ending, the 50th Anniversary Work Group is considering forming a Memory Book Work Group.

The Solar Ad Hoc Work Group held a presentation to residents on 2/19/2025. Contact the office to see the recording on their proposal to add solar panels to the roof of the clubhouse. The board approved their request to develop more details, pricing and financial pros/cons prior to final approval.

Where to Buy Native Plants

Native Plants are a wonderful addition to your landscape no matter the size of your plot. They require less maintenance and bring birds and pollinators to your garden for your enjoyment, too.

Here are some great resources to assist you in making decisions on what to purchase, plant and enjoy.

• Interactive Map of Native Plant Nurseries

Wisconsin DNR maintains a list of <u>native plant nurseries</u> in Wisconsin and neighboring states. The DNR has adapted the list into an interactive map where you can use see locations by region. Check out Wisconsin DNR extension.

• Plant Dane Program. Order by March 18!

KNOW YOUR TAMARACK NEIGHBOR – Cailin O'Conner

Cailin O'Connor, my neighbor at 9 White Pine Trail, is this month's KNOW YOUR TAMARACK NEIGHBOR. She was born in Madison, and lived briefly in Reedsburg before coming back to the west side of Madison. Her parents are Tom & Rita O'Connor, a retired Social Worker & a teacher at Eagle School, respectively.

Cailin attended Jefferson Middle School (Gillespie) & Memorial H.S. (Vel Phillips) where her extracurricular activities included being stage manager for the theatre group, and working on the student newspaper. Her first job was working at the Comedy Sportz Club in downtown Madison. She started a Comedy Sportz Team at Memorial, and this group competed against other schools. When it came time for college, she chose Macalester College, a liberal & very political school near in St. Paul that had a strong International program. Cailin always knew that she wanted to study abroad — something she got from her parents who were active in Madison Friends of International Students. Cailin was editor of the college newspaper (a very time - consuming venture), & sang in the choir.

The spring of her junior year she did study abroad in Denmark with Denmark's International Study Program. Normally, this would have been one semester, but Cailin stayed a second semester to work in an Irish pub. She then came back to Macalester to graduate, then returning to Copenhagen for four years. While studying in Denmark, Cailin met a Danish man, and they were married in 2002, right before she started graduate school at the UW — Madison in the School of Human Ecology. March of 2008, Cailin's daughter, Amalia Mortensen was born, and Cailin took six months off, before going back to part-time consulting. In 2013 Cailin & her husband separated, and then divorced in 2014. She began working full time, at home, for the Center for the Study of Social Policy, a nonprofit located in D.C.

She worked from 2013 until this January 31, 2025 with this organization, but then she quit, & started her own consulting company, CAILIN O'CONNOR CONSULTING. Cailin said she did this so she could have more control over her time, enabling her to spend more time with her daughter. This is important at this time, for Amalia probably will go off to college in Denmark with a cousin. The tuition is free to those like Amalia who hold dual citizenship. Amalia hopes to go to Denmark, when she is 19 years old, but this summer she hopes to lifeguard at the Tamarack pool.

Cailin is not all work, work, work for she works out three times/week at the Supreme Club on Odana. She participates in a low-key mom's book club every couple of months, & is currently reading Demon Copperfield. She also volunteers for Team Gold, a group that supports Democratic candidates.

In April of 2020, Cailin & Amalia moved into Tamarack, and Cailin says she loves it. Amalia can walk to school, there is a pool & there is a real sense of community. Cailin has served on an ad hoc committee for solar panels since residing here.

Cailin also loves Madison. She says it is the right size, has a lot going on especially downtown; it is an easy place to live; has diversity, and is a good place for Amelia. It doesn't hurt that Cailin has met a new friend, Firoz, who is fun to be around & a good cook of Indian food.

I can add from personal experience that she is a nice, helpful neighbor— always willing to lend a hand. It is a pleasure to have this family next door.
